*Regarding: Grand Jury Report Index # 2008, "Do Our Public Schools Have Adequate Emergency Supplies?"*

Dear Ms. Granlund,

First, the District wishes to thank the Grand Jury for its work in reviewing these important issues and for their recommendations. In accordance with California Penal Code Section 933 et seq. and per the enclosed letter dated June 10, 2020, please accept this letter as the District's response (underlined) to each finding/recommendation:

• **Findings**

- F1. *The California Education Code does not specify the type of supplies schools should maintain for emergencies.*
  - The district concurs.
- F2. *Each Contra Costa County school district determines its own emergency preparedness plans (based on California State Education Department guidelines), including the amount and type of emergency supplies to maintain at its schools.*
  - The district concurs.
- F3. *The Contra Costa County Office of Education posts on its website a recommended list (minimum standard list) of emergency supplies for school districts.*
  - The district concurs.
- F4. *Some Contra Costa County school districts did not demonstrate that they maintain supplies in conformity with the Contra Costa County Office of Education minimum standard list.*
  - The district concurs.
- F5. *Some Contra Costa County school districts fund purchasing and replenishment of emergency supplies through their annual budgets, but most school districts in Contra Costa County fund them through parent or community donations.*
  - Without speaking to what other districts in the County do, Byron Union School District uses its general funding source to purchase and replenish its emergency supplies and have not relied on parent or community donations for this specific purpose.

Instead, the District has typically relied on parent and community donations to directly fund classrooms.


- F6. *Contra Costa County school districts can apply for federal, state, corporate or non-profit organization grants to help pay for the cost of acquiring and maintain school emergency supplies.*
  - The district concurs.
- F7. *Each Contra Costa County school district has either a designated safety/resource officer or a school administrator who fills the safety/resource officer role.*
  - Without speaking to what other districts in the County do with respect to this issue, the Byron Union School District works closely with out Sheriff's Department. Each of the schools within the District have a principal who oversees school safety.
- F8. *There is no legal requirement that teachers renew CPR and First Aid certification training after teachers initially obtain their teaching credential.*
  - The district concurs.
- **Recommendations**
  - R1. *Each Contra Costa County school district board should consider adopting the Contra Costa County Office of Education Emergency Supplies list (minimum standard list) for its schools and identifying funding sources to purchase the supplies, by December 31, 2020*
    - This recommendation has been implemented...
      - The District has already secured funding sources to procure the supplies – COVID-19 state money, CARES Act funds, and or General Funds.
  - R3. *The Contra Costa County school district boards should consider applying for federal, state, corporate, and non-profit organization grants to fund the acquisition of school emergency supplies, by June 30, 2020.*
    - This recommendation has been implemented. The district is constantly researching external funding sources such as grants to promote instruction, support and safety for the District's students and employees. The District intends to

continue to search for funding opportunities including ways to procure emergency supplies.

- R4. *Each Contra Costa County school district board should consider developing a plan to identify organizations that provide CPR and First Aid certification refresher training for district teachers, by December 31, 2020.*
  - This recommendation will not be implemented at this time because there is neither a legal obligation nor the resources available to implement such training Districtwide.
    - The District has multiple relevant job descriptions that may require CPR and First Aid training including: special education paraprofessionals, all coaches, school site and district administrators. Education Code 49413 provides that a district *MAY* provide such trainings. The safety of our students and employees is always our top priority. The district is in a contract with an agency that provides the above-referenced employees with initial and refresher CPR trainings. We feel confident we can continue to promote the safety of our students and employees and not require or sponsor CPR and First Aid training for our 100 hundred plus teachers employed by the District.
    - Moreover, in accordance with current state laws, teachers and other District employees are required to receive mandated child abuse, sexual harassment and suicide prevention trainings on an ongoing basis. The District fulfills these requirements with fidelity.
  
- R5. *Each Contra Cost County school district board should consider developing a plan to identifying, if necessary, to provide CPR and First Aid certification refresher training for district teachers, by December 31, 2020.*
  - This recommendation will not be implemented at this time because there is neither a legal obligation nor the resources available to implement such training Districtwide. Please see response to R.4., above.
